For this quarterly edition, we would like to introduce you to Judy Gilleland, City Manager. Judy was appointed by Germantown City Council to her position in 2016, bringing with her a wealth of knowledge, experience, and awards earned through a career in city government spanning four decades. Prior to Germantown, Gilleland served as City Manager for the cities of Pickerington and Middletown, as well as Assistant City Manager in Centerville. Overall, she has worked in eight Ohio cities. including Lebanon, Tipp City, Dayton, and Hamilton, "I intentionally sought a diverse experience in City Management - large and small, urban, suburban and rural, well-funded and under-funded. To work through city issues that are unique in some ways and similar in other ways is fascinating," Judy explained.

Gilleland's interest in cities and government fully manifested during her undergraduate work at Miami University in a class that simulated a city government. "We elected a city council, worked with citizens, and dealt with real world issues. This class just clicked for me and inspired me to pursue a career in local government," Judy said. "City operations are 24/7/365, so the hours you work in city government are usually very demanding and multi-faceted. Every hour of every day is different; it is never monotonous," said

Gilleland, who also holds a Master's degree in Administration and is a Credentialed City Manager through the International City Management Association.

One aspect of Gilleland's job that keeps things interesting is the restrictions imposed on government action. "As City Manager, I have authority and autonomy to do many things, but I'm still bound by a very tight, process-oriented system," said Gilleland. "While these processes cause government to work more slowly, they also help ensure the protection of residents and taxpayer money," she further explained. "It can take several months or longer to pass a law. There is a lot of advance work before the law reaches City Council for a vote.

In short, there are many reasons why we can't operate at the speed of business, though I often wish we could."

Germantown is "a very special place," Judy said fondly. "The people of Germantown are hardworking and down to earth, with histories here that often stretch back for generations." Judy also appreciates the value that residents place on the city's history and the community itself. She loves the character of

the buildings as well. "Our historic downtown is something that you cannot just recreate," she explained.

Judy considers herself a demanding but fair and compassionate boss. Employees and their job satisfaction are a vital part of the picture in local government because service is the mission. "We have a great group of employees here at the City: they

> all care a great deal about the community and about assisting our residents and businesses. We require a lot from our employees and they always deliver."

> > > are largely wrapped up in her job, such as being able to participate in community and volunteer

events. When she does find time to get away, Gilleland has interests in art, food, and travel. Her husband, Sam Ashworth, is a graphic designer and musician, so they appreciate anything arts-related, as well as expanding their horizons by traveling in the US and abroad.

was held Saturday October 14th. We had popcorn, ice cream and PICKLES! Informational materials were provided along with photo props for pictures.

WINTER HAS ARRIVED!

Here are some tips for driving on icy roads to help keep you safe:

- Only go out if necessary; it's better to avoid taking unnecessary risks by venturing out.
- Drive slowly, adjusting your speed down to account for lower traction when driving on snow or ice.
- 3. Accelerate and decelerate slowly. Apply the gas slowly to regain traction and avoid skids. Don't try to get moving in a hurry and always take time to slow down for a stoplight. Remember: It takes longer to slow down on icy roads.
- 4. Increase your following distance to 5-6 seconds. This increased margin of safety will provide the longer distance needed if you have to stop.
- 5. Don't stop if you can avoid it. There's a big difference in the amount of inertia it takes to start moving from a full stop versus how much it takes to get moving while still rolling. If you can slow down enough to keep rolling until a traffic light changes, do it.

Thinking of making improvements to your downtown property? We have a tool to assist...

A Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) has been created in Germantown's Historic Downtown. Property owners in this district may apply for real property tax exemptions on renovations to or construction of new buildings. These abatements can last up to 15 years and stay with the property, even if ownership changes. Those interested in applying for this program should contact Will Parsons at the City, 937-855-7255.



Germantown Business Spotlight

Burkhardt Engineering Company

Jonathan Burkhardt, President and CEO of Burkhardt Engineering,

developed an interest in civil engineering from an early age, as he was able to observe the work his father did. "I remember my dad bringing home plans to work on and getting to visit

him at his office, and I was always intrigued by what I saw," Burkhardt recalled. Getting the opportunity to work in the industry while in college led his interest to grow and to him ultimately earning a degree in Civil Engineering. This interest, experience, and an entrepreneurial spirit have served him well as President and CEO for the past 7 years.

Burkhardt Engineering works primarily in civil engineering and land surveying, a business that keeps them busy in Ohio and abroad. While civil engineering is a field containing many disciplines, the main focus of Burkhardt is on site development. Jonathan explained, "We work with architects and land developers to design and develop sites. We design parking lots and access, grading and drainage, underground utility services, storm water management, and soil erosion control measures." All of these are important items that, if handled poorly, can lead to negative impacts on the environment, the safety of those utilizing the property, and the long-term maintenance of the site. However, Burkhardt Engineering's focus on quality work ensures that these types of issues don't occur. "We strive to do the job right the first time and treat our clients the right way throughout the process,"

said Burkhardt. A sentiment that Jonathan added is echoed to them by their clients. He went on to reference the "unattainable triangle," a concept which states that businesses can only pick two out of quality, speed, and price. "We always focus on quality and speed," said Burkhardt, "I was taught that a race to the bottom on fees isn't a good way to run a business. We don't want to do that and start cutting corners or putting out sloppy work. We are always trying to bring a higher quality product and greater value to our clients."

Burkhardt Engineering also puts an emphasis on maintaining a family-oriented

environment, something that Jonathan says, "You can't do unless you care about the

people you are working with." As a manager of people, he feels a lot of responsibility when hiring someone, knowing that they are counting on their job for their family, well-being, and long-term success. Some of the ways they do this are through competitive benefits packages, profit-sharing bonus programs, flexibility when it comes to work/ life balance, and a team environment where everyone is working toward the same goals. "It's sad that much of the business world has largely lost the sense of this and treat people like numbers," said Jonathan.

When looking at past projects, Burkhardt shared that there is an excitement that comes with development for corporate chains due to their fast-paced nature. There is also pride in viewing them as a collection, one that now includes over 300 single-tenant retail stores and 100 car washes built. However, on a more individualized level, he also greatly appreciates doing institutional or quasi-institutional projects, such as the pre-k through 6th grade Wayne local schools facility. They have also worked on many of the Dayton Public Libraries. Jonathan finds it meaningful knowing that these facilities will help to serve their communities and be useful for many different types of people.

On top of the company, the Burkhardt family also has one in Germantown. Jonathan and his sister were both raised here and his



parents have been residents for over 40 years. They still live only a block or two away from the company's building on Cherry Street, a building which originally housed a hardware store that Jonathan's grandfather used to own (Huber Hardware). Jonathan remembers fondly running the cash register and stocking the shelves there as a child. "There's a lot of history here," said Burkhardt, a history Jonathan is surely reminded of whenever he sees the old shelves that have been kept as a beautiful accent piece in their conference room.

Jonathan shared that Burkhardt Engineering has always appreciated and enjoyed being in Germantown. They have built a history and reputation here that continues to guide them to success.

Questions & Answers

TAX SEASON IS HERE!

Tax time is fast approaching, and it's not too early to prepare! We've provided some important "frequently asked questions" below, along with contact information for assistance with Germantown tax matters.

Am I Required to Make Estimated Tax Payments?

If you estimate that you will owe at least \$200.00 in municipal income tax (after subtracting anticipated withholding and credits), you need to make estimated tax payments. Penalty and interest charges will apply if you have not paid at least 90% of the current tax year liability, or an amount equal to 100% of the prior year tax liability. If you are unsure as to what you will owe for the current year, you can avoid any penalty and interest charges by paying 100% of the prior year liability (known as "safe harbor").

This \$200 threshold (as well as quarterly due dates) has been established by the Ohio Legislature, in Ohio Revised Code section 718. Payments are due on a quarterly basis, throughout the year, as you are earning the income subject to the tax. This is not a pre-payment – you are paying each quarter as you are earning the income.

Estimated tax due for the current year is established when you prepare your annual return for the previous taxable year. For example, when you prepare vour 2023 Germantown income tax return, establishing your estimated tax liability for tax year 2024 is part of this return. First quarter 2024 is due with the filing of the 2023 tax return, by 4/15/24. Once CCA (Central Collection Agency, which handles Germantown's taxes) receives this return, and sets up your estimated tax payment schedule for 2024, you will receive reminder notices for the remaining quarters.

Due dates are:

1st quarter 2024 estimated tax-Due 4/15/24

2nd quarter 2024 estimated tax – Due 6/15/24

3rd quarter 2024 estimated tax – Due 9/15/24

4th quarter 2024 estimated tax - Due 1/15/25

If the filing of your 2023 return is under extension, and will not be filed

until October 15, 2024, CCA will not be able to establish your liability for 2024 estimated tax and send you reminder notices. You will need to send in these payments without reminder, using the schedule above. Need help in calculating what you owe? CCA can help you determine your estimated liability! Didn't get all quarters paid? As long as your total estimated liability is paid by the fourth quarter due date, payments are considered to be timely filed and paid.

Haven't finished paying your 2023 estimated tax? Fourth quarter is due by 1/15/24 – contact CCA to make payment by this date! Payments can be made by phone by calling the Cleveland office at 216-664-2070.

Contact CCA with any questions you might have on how to estimate your tax due or make estimated tax payments. You can also print, prepare and mail your estimated tax form with payment. Forms are available at www.ccatax.ci.cleveland. oh.us, click on the "tax forms" link on the left.

What Is the Due Date for Filing My 2023 City Income Tax Return?

For individuals and for calendar year business return filers, the filing due date is Monday, April 15, 2024.

How Can I Get Assistance With Completing My City Income Tax Return?

APPOINTMENTS

on-site: CCA provides the service of on-site, by appointment only assistance (to give you confidential, in person assistance) during tax season on two different dates in Germantown. These dates will be announced in mid-January, and you can contact the local CCA representatives to schedule a time. These appointments are first

come / first served. Appointments are available in other CCA cities and villages in the Dayton region, and you can schedule your appointment for any location.

DROP OFF / MAIL IN SERVICE:

Complete a "Taxpayer Assistance Form" (online at ccatax.ci.cleveland. oh.us – Tax Forms 2023 – Taxpayer Assistance form or available at the City of Germantown), attach copies of all W-2 forms, federal schedules, page 1 and 2 of federal return, 1099's, and all income / tax statements (list of documents needed is included on the form), and

The signed form must be included in order for CCA to prepare your return. Your return will be prepared, and a copy mailed back to you. You will be billed for any amounts due, plus any applicable assessed charges. Please keep in mind that all payments due still follow due dates as established by Tax Ordinance. Utilizing this service does not extend the date for paying tax due. Documents must be dropped off or mailed by 3/31/24 to utilize this service.

Who Are My Local CCA Representatives?

In addition to the many auditors available to assist in Cleveland (contact 216-664-2070), CCA has two representatives in the Dayton region who are available to assist with any Germantown tax matter. They can assist with preparing returns, calculating estimated tax, answering questions you may have on any billings or letters received, or any other questions that may come up!

The MMI Park Committee continues to meet regularly to stay on track with the timeline of goals for the park. The latest visible project has been the completion of a parking area at the top of the hill, which is similarly situated to the original MMI parking area. Shane Dill with Dill's Excavating, Inc. provided his services and donated his labor for this project. Other works in progress are the finalization of bronze plaques and obtaining park benches. Two bronze plaques providing historical information on the Miami Military Institute

and Camp Miami will eventually be placed near the restored flagpole. Park benches are being produced through a plastic recycling program and will be placed throughout the park property at the location of markers commemorating former MMI cadets who were killed in action. The MMI Park Committee encourages residents to visit the park to enjoy the beautiful surroundings and to observe the progress taking place. The park is located off of Warren St. across from Veterans Memorial Park.

Water Pollution DID YOU KNOW?



Solid waste and sediment are among the top 5 most common pollutants entering our water cycle? These common pollutants enter the water cycle in a variety of ways; accidental or deliberate spills, improperly treated wastewater, erosion or runoff.

Solid waste includes items that should have been disposed of in a landfill or incinerated but instead are uncontained in the environment where they can harm wildlife and clog stormwater systems. Sources of trash include careless and intentional littering, historic dumping and loose garbage set outside on windy days. You can do your part to reduce solid waste pollution by keeping solid waste contained and disposing of it properly and by removing it from local waterways.

Sediment most often comes from soil erosion, which happens when storm water washes bare soil into streams. Sediment can smother stream habitat, alter stream flow and increase nutrients to harmful levels. Sources include uncovered soil on lawns; gardens and farmlands; slumping streambank; muddy construction sites; poorly maintained dirt and gravel roads; and careless logging practices. They key to preventing soil erosion is slowing down the stormwater where it falls because slow moving water contains less erosive energy. Achieving this is often as simple as covering bare soil with garden mulches or crop residues.

Thank you for doing your part in keeping Germantown's waterways safe and healthy for all to enjoy.
